Reflection Guide to the Prophet Isaiah

Meeting is Tuesday, January 21 at 7:30 p.m.

Scholars divide Isaiah into two or three parts: Chapters 1-39, during Isaiah's lifetime from 742 until 701 or 687 B.C.E. when the Northern Kingdom of Israel was annexed to the Assyrian empire and the Southern Kingdom of Judah was a tributary. Chapters 40-66 come from the time of Cyrus of Persia (539 B.C.E.), immediately after the fall of Babylon to Cyrus and the return of the people who were in exile. Chapters 55-66 are sometimes called Third Isaiah and suggest a latter date of between 530 and 510 B.C.E. More details can be found in the introduction to the book.

Four overarching questions for our discussion:

- 1. How does Isaiah view God working in human events? As a child how did you? How do you now?
- 2. How does Isaiah view individual and communal sin and redemption? As a child how did you? How do you now?
- 3. Do Isaiah's warnings have any relevance to recent history or current events?
- 4. How would you hear and interpret Isaiah if you were a member of an oppressed nation or group? As an American?
